#IAMHOMEWARDPET Cody Touchette

If you have bought a home in the Bothell/Woodinville area in the past few years, you might have worked with Cody Touchette and the Caliber Home Loan's Team.

During the day, Cody works to help families and individuals find their forever homes, but in his spare time, he works to help the homeless cats and dogs at Homeward Pet Adoption Center (HPAC) find their forever homes.

Cody and Mac originally adopted Baxter, a young mixed breed pup, from Homeward Pet in 2008. After adopting, Cody got more involved with Homeward Pet. He learned about the Homeward Pet Whoopi's Fund for Animals with Special Needs, that provides medically fragile animals with the medical care they need when they come to HPAC. He found out more about the Public Spay & Neuter Clinic that supports pets owned by lower income members of our community. He was struck by the Food Bank program that extends our reach to needy families as far out as Eastern Washington.

The program that stuck out the most to him was the Homeward Pet Behavior Program. This Program screens cats and dogs with behavioral challenges to assess their fears, anxiety and stress and how those affect the behaviors that often land them in a shelter in the first place. Our Behavior Team creates individualized behavior plans to lower each animals' stressors, mitigate challenging behaviors and ultimately, create opportunities for adoption. This is a testament to the lifesaving work at Homeward Pet because many times, these animals have been overlooked in other shelters.





Cody felt a special passion for this program and decided to get more involved. He joined the Board of Directors in 2017 and quickly became a strong and vocal advocate for Homeward Pet. Initially, he just shared the mission, and then he amplified his voice financially by sponsoring events and a variety of programs at the shelter.



Every time he signs a check, he knows, "For every one time I give, I get 3-4 times back. Not in money, but in reward and feeling. The gratitude is huge and it feels good and that feeling is unmatched in my normal everyday life."

Cody has now supported HPAC for over 10 years. We are grateful for the many incredible individuals who have seen our evolution through the years and stayed steadfast in their commitment to supporting Homeward Pet Adoption Center.

BOONE – A TALE OF COMMITMENT

Boone arrived at Homeward Pet in May of this year, terrified and shaking. **At 9 months old, he was already so very scared of the world**. Our Behavior Manager knew we needed to come up with a clear plan for his care and confidence building.

Homeward Pet uses Fear Free practices for all of the animals under our roof. The strange sights, smells, and sounds combined with the presence of unfamiliar people and animals can cause uneasiness. Fear Free entails making decisions to prevent and alleviate fear, anxiety, and stress in pets during every interaction.

Fear Free thinking makes us look at things like the aromas of the cleaners we use, the sounds that the animal is exposed to, the speed of movement of the people sharing their space, the types of holds and touch, and the things we expect from the animal. When the animal feels in some level of control of their environment, they can make decisions that are not based out of fear, stress or anxiety.

Boone was set up in an isolated room, with soothing music, a calming collar and very defined interactions. He has had limited trusted volunteers who let him set the pace. **Our Behavior Team monitors his progress daily and makes tweaks to his care plan as necessary.** He has slowly emerged from his shell to reveal a loving, playful, cuddly companion underneath.

Despite what might seem an ability and ample space to provide such a custom plan for just one dog, our shelter is busting at the seams. **To relieve stress and anxiety for the animals, we've used rooms and spaces that have never been used for animal care in the past**. Our dream is to buy land in the Woodinville area and build a brand-new shelter and community space within the next 8 years. But the animals in our care also need us to be there for them now.

We have identified that the next step for us is a full Dog Room Remodel to better allow for Fear Free living spaces for the dogs during their stay with us; then we will be expanding the Clinic and reimaging the Cat Room and our Administrative Areas. This is an expensive undertaking, but one that will better support our work in all areas of the shelter, now and into the future.

We have started talks with architects and are excited about construction starting this Fall. We are grateful to the many partners that have stepped in so far to help make this vision a reality.
